TWENTIETH SPEAKER: Let us now toast the **PORTRAIT** of Cornelius Porter.

The twentieth speaker offers a toast.

LEADERS: To the **PORTRAIT!**

TWENTY-FIRST SPEAKER: This is the story of the **PORTRAIT** of Cornelius Porter, that

did hang with great dignity upon the wall of the Holy Apartment, and of the comfort it did bring to Henry

Porter in his time of illness and distress. *The twenty-first speaker recounts the story.*
